

INTERMITTING AND WITHDRAWING FULL TIME UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Students may wish to take a break from their studies because of illness, or for financial and personal reasons. If this is done with the agreement of the University it is known as intermitting and the student will be able to resume their studies at a later date.

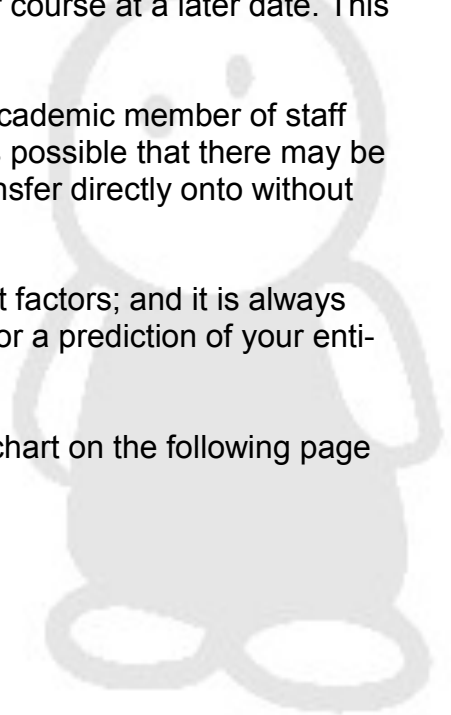
However, students may wish to withdraw from their course altogether in order to pursue other career options or enrol on another course at a later date. This is known as withdrawing.

You may want to discuss your concerns with an academic member of staff before deciding on your next course of action. It is possible that there may be another, more suitable course, that you could transfer directly onto without interrupting your student funding.

However, this will depend on a number of different factors; and it is always advisable to consult the Student Advice Centre for a prediction of your entitlement to student finance.
